10 crossed Grand river, West fork at Gentryvill, Gentry County, rained caipt on a long prairie 20 mi wide pretty land
Pleasant day ine land, timber scarce, canpt 15 mi Iram St Joseph Crossed the Platte River and hundred and two which is quite a stream, campt within 4 mi of St Jo
13. Went to town, wind blowed hard, disagreable day.

14 Stayed at camp and wrote two letters.

16 Sunday morning
17 irostv mornin sitartes on nur inumef

18th sost this morning, clear an : pleasant, crossed we river in a flat bont, got across about 3 OC went out 5 mi to clear creek, good watter and grass, hilly country
19 Very cool this mominc, laid by till ar'temoon, grass snort very rolling prairies with little clumps oi trees in the hollows. Went 4 mi , campt by grove
20 Frosty morning, clear and pleasant, hich rolling prairies with a l'ew scattering of trees in the hollows, grass good, crossed Kosquitoe Creek clear watter. Also woli caeck, the Indians have a bridge here, they charge $25 \phi$ per waggon lor crossing, saw one new grave, Co. all well.
21 Rained last ni bht but we have a good tent, to sleep in and are all happy as kings. raining this morning, laid over till noon, passed Indian Agency at this place there quite a number oiamericans living, it is the adency 0 . the Miami and Kickapoo Indians, there is several fine farms here, campt on Mill creek, saw 4 new graves.
22 Cloudy and cool, pretty prairies with little groves or along the streams saw 8 new graves, campt at a $s m_{n} l l$ creek with a lew scattering trees along it, come 22 miles.
23 Sunday, warm today traveled 21 miles saw 7 new graves, campt $1 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{mi}$ South o road, good place, irstrate watter, all one vast prairie
24 Warm, crossed Nimehaw, this is quite a stream, plenty oi timber, saw 8 new graves, campt on a little creek 0:' clear watter, some seattered trees along its banks, one case of Cholera on the road.
25 Rained last night heavy wheeling, crossed Little Jimehaw, hilly country some timber, saw 5 new graves, campt on Elm creek, watter poor.
26 Fogey this morning, crossed Rock creek at noon, poor watter, got to Big Blue Kiver in good season, iordedit, ca:pt on the west side by a first rate spring, of clear cold watter, saw 9 new graves today.
27 Laid over to wash. went in a swimning. A drove oi -- passed today, one of their Co. died last night, good many teams passed today
28 Started bright and early, passed the intersection oi the Independence road, saw one of Mr. Hick's droves, he is taking ' 2400 head of cattle to Cali. crossed Cottonwood creek, campt on a little stream about one mile south of the road, poor watter, saw 3 new graves today, clear and warm.
$29 \mathrm{u}_{\text {lear }}$ and warm, crossed several syall streams with some standing watter in them, watter poor crossed Withe Creek, campt saw 8 new graves today. Met a tean of waggons lirom the rocky mountains, 17 in all, they had 7000 Buifalo robes.
30 Sunday, we pusn along keep moving, the country is geviing poorer, we crossed big Sandy and dry sandy and a good many small creeks with steep sandy banks and watter poor, some entirely dry, we campt on a small stream witn a little standing watter in it. Co all well, saw 11 graves today.
31 Very warm today, roads considerable rough and sandy, we passed a good many teams that stopt on account oi slekness, one good spring today, 21 graves
June Ist
travelled alon: the little bleu iver it is about a rod wide and about 3 feet deep, there is some Cottonwood along the banks, the land along the river is sandy, there is a lew springs along the river but no other watter running into the river rom the north side, rassed a good many that were sick. saw 15 new graves today, very warm, cappt on the banks of the river, good place.
2 traveled along little blue until noon, crossed over creek of clean nice water, that ran inw we olue. solie good land along the river, saw 7 antelopes, lef't the river crossed a creek some timber water poor. Met a train oi 10 waUgons, loaded with bulifalo robes and iurs, clear and hot rainel very hard in the nitht and the wind blowed one tent down, saw 7 graves

3 rd $C o o l$ and cloudy this morninc, the land today is level and sandy, got in sight of the blufls of llatte river -10 OC, there is not timber on the bluifs, canpt on the Platte about b miles from the fort. Had to burn little willows to cook. some tinber on an Island but we could not get to it. Saw 6 new graves.
Lth Clear and lleasant, passed :'ont kearney, there is about 60 soldiers here, 'Ihere had passed here up to the lst of June - Li,931 wageons. Cattle 50,809 ven 14,021, Women 3,1.20, children 4,092. Horses, 6041, mules 3,37\%, sheep 2,013. Campt 4 miles rom the cort on the banks 0 - the Flatte, nothing to make lire with but willows. 5 graves today.
Stn Cool in the mo ninr, hot at noon and cool and cloudy in the evening, traveled along the Platte, nowood but on the lstand, had to use Bufialo chips and dig ior watter, 2 graves, raine just as we ate supper.
6th Cool this morning, traveled along the river bottoin, crossed Flumb Creek, a small grove at the loot o. the bluri's, saw the first bu:falo today, gave it a chace and H . Hyde shot it. Saw a great many teans on the oposite side oi the river, caupt on the bank of the river, no wood.
7 th Rained this morning and the wind blowed nard, the wolves got aiter the cattle in the nignt and run them o+i about-ive miles, bit some of tnem pretty bad. the bottom here were verry wide, road -irstrate. Campt near the river, no wood, 5 graves.
8 th Cold treis morning, pleasant througn the day, passed Bradys island, plenty $\mathrm{O}_{\mathrm{i}}$ timber on it and a lew trees on the banks of the river, crossed Cottonwood Creek, some timber and standing watter, also Ash Creek, the bluifs here are high and broken, bottoms about a mile and a half wide, roads first rate. 6 graves, campt 1 mile rom Ash creek. $37 \%$ miles from St Joseph
9 th Pleasant, I went out with 6 others a nunting, went up the bluffs in the neighbourhood of Ash creek. Blu:is verry high and rough, one continuall string of steep hills and deep ravines, some Cedar and Cottonwood trees in the hollows. These hills extend back 4 or 5 miles. Saw a great manny Antelope and about 50 or 60 Builialo, gave them chace, run them 5 or 6 miles over steep hills and shot at some of them but didnot get them. Started back to overtake the waggons, traveled till after dark and stopt with a train about 5 miles behind our own. Tired and hungry. 15 graves. Plenty of good watter about half a mile north 0 the road.
10th Came up to the waggons just after breakfast. Crossed the south fork of Platte river, verry good crossing, put blocks under the waggons boxes and doubbled teams. The river is verry wide and shallow, went up the north fork, roads good, weather warm, grass short, used river watter, campt in the bank ofriver, saw 3 new graves.
llth Traveled along the bottoms till noon. stream o. watter to the right of road, good springs oi watter along the creek, for several miles. Cedar bluff's - 429 miles irom St Jo. went up a long hill but not very steep, werry hot wind, blowed verry hard and the sand floew so that we could hardly see, verry disagreable day to travel. Long hill to go down to get on the bottom again, didn't get to the river till af'ter dark, some time we were all tired and hungry. I was about hall sick and had no watter to drink but river watter. 4 graves.
12th Went about 5 miles and campt. Road runs close to the river, some hills. roads sandy, dug a well and got good watter, grass tolerable good, some of our oxen lame, in good condition otherwise.

## 13th

Sunday- laying over to rest our teams. Company all well, warm and pleasant, rained in the evening, rest came in goo time. I lay in the tent and slept while the cool wind blowed around my head. Some were sleeping, some playing cards, some reading, some washing and some went out a hunting. The hunter broupht an antelope into camp. There were a good manny teams passed us today on this and the other side of the river.

Got an errly start this momine, some piaces the botoms are pretty wide and sometimes the blu:s exten to the iven, the points that extend to the river are not very high, but sendy and heavy houzing. The main bluffs are rocky and rouch. Je baite werr the river were there has been a small grove 0 cedar trees, feed pool. A termoon went over the blufls into Ash hollow, long hill to ascend and descend, went dow Ash hollow to the river, high rocky bluils on each side, Ash iHollow is 409 miles St Jo. A.ter we struck the river re keyt close to the blui-s the road is verry sandy in places, some cedar trees alone the bluin's and some ash trees in Ash Hollov, some springs alone here and considerable alkali watter. 8 new graves.
25 th Roads today have been verry sandy, heav hauling, some dry creeks with steep banks, high rocky broken bluis, sone verry curious lidoking rocks bottoms narrow, grass poor, just before nisht we $c$ me to where the bottoms were wide and grass pretty fair. I/ praves.
15th Clear and pleasant, got an early start this mownine, roads verry sandy in places feed rather poor, considerable alkali watter, some cedar groves on the blui's several miles oil. Blui s not so high along here, campt near some good springs, no wood, buf alo chips scarce. 13 graves.
27 th On the move pietty early, sar Chimney and Courthouse rocks early in the morning, crossed Lawrence creek, baited*opposite courthouse rock. Had quite a blow and some rain in the aiternoon. Campt to the left oi'road about 1 mile on a nice rise of ground, three irstrate springs here. 3 miles from Chimney look, some grand scenery high rocky blufis, some cedar groves in the distance, grass tolerable good. 10 graves.
18th Startec late this morning, went antook a view oi Chimney Rock there is manny -- in it 200 leet irom the bottom. There is a great manny curiositys here, the rocks are two or three hundred ieet high and in a great manny shapes. Considerable many cedar trees growing along the bluirs, campt near the river 10 miles irom Scotts Bluils, there is a blacksmith here, they charge 10 dollars ior setting waggons tires all around. \$4 for shoeing an ox, and they ask $\$ 15^{\prime}$ per hundred for flour. Some of the cattle are verry lame and have been sometime. 2 graves. Chimney Hock is 524 miles (irom st Jo)
19th E. D. Lemoin had to leave one oinis oxen, he got 5 dollars for it. The road lei't the river long hill to ascend to get on the blui'is, roads f'irst rate untill we got to Scotts Bluils, here there was some deep revines steep banks. Verry long hill to descend to set on the bottoms again. Here are some of the highest rocks I have ever seen. By hard work I got to the top oi one oi them, here was least ior the eyes, had a splendid view of Laramie peak at the distance of 100 miles, some Pine timber along the blulis, there is a U. S. mail station and a blacksmith shop here, also some Erench traders and Indians, the "̈irst Indians I have seen since we left ort Kearney, Capt near the river some or the company had to get their waggons lixed. Have to use river watter, settled with Prickly Pears. Saw 6 graves. Scotts Bluif 554 miles. Sunday, laying over to repiir waggon. A great manny teams passed us today round 2 springs, tolerable good watter. Wrote a long ledter home. Clear clst and tharm, Company all well and full of un.

On the move early, che blutis not so high here, country more level. Came up with some teams that $h_{z}$ d stampeded, killed one man and broke 2 waggons. Crossed a sinall creek tolerable bad to cross, also Horse creek, this is a broad shallow stream, good crossing, cool and cloudy in the evening.
22nd 5 Eraves.
Cloudy and cool this morning, lef't the river, went over the blu.f's roads very sandy untill we stauck the bottom again in a few miles, roads good alons the bottom, cleared oll about noon clouded up again and rained

on the blu as about hal a mile rom he iver, plentio diry wood. 8 graves. Horse Lireed 506 miles .
kained all the forenoon fently, cloudy ans cool in the artemoon, travelled about one mile and cone onto the bottons again, rassed an Indian village and several trading posts, crosses Larine cork o_ flatte river a little after noon, there is a bridge hure, uney charge 2 dollars ior 4 yoke of oxen and waggon. $25 ¢$ or a horse. the ort was lat miles to the leit of road, went on about 5 miles anci campi near he river, plenty or wood. We are now anong the black hills, they look beautirul, scattering trees all over them. 2 graves. Fort Larime 604 ( rom St. Jo)
ternoon rained hard but we did not stop, road hilly some laces verry steep and locky, left the river, crossed bitter Cottonwood creek and another small creek, plenty of wood end watter, the river is narrow and rappid, pine and ceder on all the hills, carpt in a valley. 6 graves.
25 th Clear in morning, heav rain shedd about noon. Crossed Dead I'imber Creek, some irstrate springs. Some long hills and some places steep. Came to the river in two places, in some places the river runs between perpendicular rocks, had a line view oi Larime Peak, saw snow on it. Campt near the river at the foot oi the blufis, plenty of wood. 6 graves. Horse Creek 641 miles.
20th Ascended long hill and descended into a valley along the river, then ascended another long gravely hill on the top 0 - whitch had a splendid view of Larime Feak and surrounding mountains. Iraveled on a ridge between two creeks, several hills. Aiternoon kept on the ridge went down a long hill some 3 miles long to Laboute river, crossed over and campt La Boute river 669 miles, 6 graves.

This is the end of the first book, the next is more interesting, and is a continuation of this first one.

* on page 4, "baited", its definitely baited, but I have no idea what the word means.

The spelling is Grandiathers and I have lef't it as is in most cases. All the words that have double s's in them such as grass, are written to look like grafs, which was the old way of doing. At that I think his vocabulary and even his spelling were good, for that day and age.

He probably had no idea that he was writing for posterityl otherwise he might have put in: the arrangements for the trip and with whom, how he travelled, whether he walked, rode, drove a wagon, or what. Later on I believe he mentions something about selling his pony, so maybe he rode all the way.

In the back or this iirst book he has a hand drawn calendar with the days marked ofr, and a reco of the letters he wrote back home, with the addresses, but in most cases just the initials of the people to whom he wrote.

I have his birthdate somewhere, but would have to look it up, I believe his was born in the late lozo's, so he must have been in his 20's when he started this trip.

Sundzy June the 27th 1852
Clear and warm, roads verry hilly and stoney, traveled about 5 males to branch of La Boute river, the eartin for 0 or 3 miles on each side has a dark red a:pearance, about, o miles we cane to a small stream, good spring below the road. Road hillyall the way. Hycle's little girl
fell out of the waggon and it ran over ner, nur t pretty bad. Arternoon roads verry hilly and gravely, hard on cattles feet, high mountains on all sides. Plenty oi wood along the streans, canpt on Laphrete? river found a srring or clean cold water, 4 graves.
Got a late start rnis morning, went about 1 mile and crossed Laprele river, bold rapid current, about 2 rods wide, plenty oi timber, 4 miles Iu wher a small creex, water poor. I mile -urther Box Elder Creek, plenty oi 1 irstrate watter, not much timber, b miles iurther Inttle Deer creek from tiere to the river sandy. In the evening cloudy, wind blowed hard very austy. o graves.
Gin Traveled about 3 or 4 miles to a lerry lately got up by some emigrants. It is about 30 miles below the upper crossing, they charge $\$ 3$ per waggon have to swim the cattle. We have to walt until tomorrow to cross. A man by the name of Case from Ko. was drowned today, he was driving cartle on norseback, the horse threw hirn and he could not make the shore, he lel't a wile and one child.
30th Got across the river about noon, all sate. hoad nilly and crooked and very sandy, timber plenty, siass ratner scarce. Campt near the river by a nice -- (corner dogeared, so last word is gone.)
July the lst
We have traveled through a sandy barren country today, the roads have been heavy and rough and runs close to the river, plenty oi timber ior camping purposes, no watter but river watter, campt 4 miles from the main ferry. They charge $\$ 5$ per wageon and driver, $50 \phi$ apiece for men. they have 3 grocerys at this ferry. They charge $\$ 0$ per gallon for brandy, $25 \phi$ per drink i'or whiskey, saw 4 new graves.
ind we traveled 4 miles and came to the upper crossing, there were a good manny teans here. is miles further we came to Mineral springs and lake, the water below these springs poisonous then the watter stirred up it becomes black. About ? miles urther we passed between some high rocks that Iom a kind oi gateway. 2 miles iurther we came to Alkali swamp and springs, 4 miles further a small creek, here we campt by a spring, the roads this distance sonewhat hilly, the country covered with wild sage but verry little grass-- 702 miles irom St. Jo. 2 graves.
3rd Got a late start, went 4 miles to Nillow Springs, good watter here. Ascended a long hill from whitch had a ine view of the sweetwatter mountain. 4 miles further crossed deep slough. About a mile further ascended and descended a steep hill near the loot of which is a saall creek. About $2 \frac{1}{2}$ miles further we came to annother small creek tr veled alon; this creek about 1 mile. $1 \frac{1}{2}$ miles further we crossed Greaswood creek. traveled down the creek a peice and campt the country along here is barren and sandy. Sage
4 th On the move greaswood, pretty thick along here, grass verry scarce. 2 graves. and Lake move this moming tolerable early, traveled on to the Alkali Springs and Lake, 6 miles Irom Greaserood Creek. At this place are several acres of low swampy ground covered with a crust of baleratus in places several inches thick which at a distance has the appearance of snow. 'the ground under this is very miry. Absut 4 miles iu ther we arrived at Sweetwatter l mile Iurther indeoendence lock, this rock stands on the north side of the river and is so close to the bank that there is but room ior waggons to pass. It is composed of hard pranite and is a sinfular curiosity. It stands alone near a mile trom anny other rocks or chain ol mountains, it is 600 yds

jare 2
emigrants put on with paint or cut in. One mile iurther we crossed sweetwatter, the river here is about 8 rods wide rappid currant, 4 miles further we came to Devils Gate, this is a place where the river passes between perpendicular rocks 400 ft high, campt near this gate. Verry windy and dusty. Raineci and snowed a little in the aiternoon. Some wood. 2 graves.
Sth waite cold this morning. Did not start out till afternoon, traveled on about $\frac{1}{2}$ mile and crossed 2 small creeks. A little lurther passed a trading post.
